

HARRY CORNEY 1940-2016

Robert Harry Corney, Harry, H, Dad, Grandad or of course Grandad PopPop.... whatever you knew him as, nobody could deny he was always the life and soul of wherever he was. His unmissable laugh and cheeky character would never fail to draw you in.

Harry was born at Moss End Farm in Easingwold in January 1940, one of seven children, to Ted and Ellen. The family settled in Dalby Forest in 1946 where Ted was a horseman extracting timber with the Forestry Commission. Harry helped his father looking after the giant working horses, and it was a natural progression that he would go on to work for the FC. Later he moved on to work for a company laying new utility pipes in various parts of the country, and met his wife-to-be Maureen whilst working near Otley. He would proudly say he "rescued her from the West Riding". The family moved to Wykeham in 1969, where Harry started work on the farm, and the family grew to four sons. He remained at the farm until his retirement at 60. Both Harry and Maureen threw themselves into village life, with Harry playing cricket for Wykeham, which he loved. His best bowling average was 7 for 9, the last 3 balls of the over taking a hat-trick.

In December 1999 Maureen passed away and anyone who knew Harry will know that a part of him went with her. He did his best to get on with life: took early retirement, spent the winter months beating for the Keepers on the Estate, took up bowling, and made some great friends. Harry's love of live music would see him follow his favourite bands around Scarborough with his close group of friends from the village.

The news of Harry's illness was devastating, and his family, friends and neighbours were amazing in their support. He was a proud man who didn't easily accept help but was always willing to give it, never interested in gossip and would never judge people. Over £700 was collected at Harry's funeral, to go to St Catherine's Hospice and the Hospice at Home Service. Harry's memory will live on in a new Memorial Trophy to be awarded to the Scarborough Evening League Best Bowler for the "A" team at Wykeham Cricket Club.

PARISH COUNCIL

Here is a selection of items from the draft minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 9 February. The full minutes may be found on the Parish Council website www.wykehamparishcouncil.org.uk Current legislation now dictates that the draft minutes are to be available online within a month of the meeting.

- The village plan There was some degree of concern that there were very few new topics that had been identified since the last survey conducted some 18 months ago and consequently there was apprehension on the cost of a similar type of "glossy" publication this time round. It was felt that provision of a faster internet service in the parish and a speed reduction for Ruston were the 2 items that would be the focus of a new village plan. However, it was apparent from recent discussions that there seemed little chance of any success of either of these achieving the desired outcome. Cllr Jeffels advised that Hutton Buscel had recently had a substantial return rate on a recent survey about their village plan and that they had received consultancy support from Chris Brogdan (SBC). It was agreed that Cllr Jeffels would make contact with Mr Brogdan on behalf of the parish council and explore the possibility of inviting him to advise on a potential way forward and maybe explore the possibility of him being a guest speaker at the Annual Meeting.
- Cllr Jeffels also agreed to look into funding possibilities for speed awareness lights for Ruston and the provision of SLOW signage at the entrances of the hamlet.
- NYCC Highways had inspected the 'sinkhole' on Town End, Ruston and it was felt that there was not a significant problem. Cllr Colley stated that the road had continued to dip and extended across the full extent of the road. Cllr Jeffels agreed to have the issue checked again with the assistance of Wykeham Estate to clearly identify the exact location.
- Cllr Sword also made Cllr Jeffels aware that the continuation of Eastgate from Ruston, north to Rowe Howe, was deteriorating rapidly and could that be also be inspected on the same visit. It was noted that this road was a "county" highway.
- Cllr Ashman provided an update on the North Moor Speed Reduction Project. Delivery on the first signage was complete and the remaining signage was expected in the near future. A list of NYCC Approved Contractors was reviewed and it was agreed to obtain a quotes from 2 local contractors.
- •The clerk and Cllr Ashman reported that the grit bin had finally been installed and filled NYCC contractors had incorrectly positioned it at the first attempt and then had left debris on the verge at the site which required a further visit to clear. Cllr Jeffels noted the concerns of the parish council on the use of external contractors for this task.
- The clerk reminded members that provision had been made in this year's budget to commission and install a new notice board for North Moor. The existing board is too small and open and offers no protection against the elements. Cllr Ashman has obtained a provisional quote of £500.00. Cllr Jeffels advised members that he has some provision for funding under the Locality Fund and would be prepared to make £300.00 available to the parish council to assist in the provision of this project. The members expressed their collective appreciation of this gesture and agreed to fund the remaining amount from reserves.
- Grass Cutting Contract 2016/7 The members acknowledged that Joe Harrison had continued to provide a competitive service and had totally met the requirements asked for by the council in what was a difficult year with the withdrawal of NYCC funding. It was agreed to retain his services for 2016 on the existing basis with the provision of weed control at the start and end of the season. Cllr Day agreed to liaise with Joe Harrison.
- Cllr Ashman had made an informal approach to the Forestry Commission Office at North Moor about the state of the adjoining land. It was agreed that the clerk write to the Forestry Commission on behalf of the council to express their collective concerns and state very clearly that the efforts of the residents to keep the hamlet in good order and the recent speed awareness project partly funded by the council were undermined somewhat by the lack of maintenance of the land adjoining the highway through the village.
- Cuadrilla Resources North Yorkshire License for 'Fracking' The clerk had forwarded an email from Cuadrilla to the members prior to the meeting but the clerk and members had found it impossible to access and reproduce detailed maps for the area from the provided web link. It was possible however to ascertain that the parish boundary fell inside a map sector that they had approval to explore. Whilst the members were concerned with this development, the clerk confirmed that the council had not been asked to comment on any planning consultations to date.

• The clerk had been contacted by the clerk of Ebberston PC regarding a planning application for an aircraft runway at Langdale End. The clerk advised that Wykeham Parish council had not been consulted.

ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

Following my last little piece, I continue my toddle round Wykeham, and my next call is at the first of four houses built after WWII. The first house, with a lovely garden, was occupied for many years by the late Les Dees and Mavis, his wife. Les died last year and is greatly missed by us all for his joie de vivre and his cheerful presence. Mavis worked for many years for Dr Spence in Hutton Buscel. Further along the row came the Stockdales and at the end lived Mrs Palmer, who was always good for a cup of tea and a generous donation to the Poppy Appeal! The first house on the corner, where Craig and Karen live, was at one time occupied by the retired butler from the Abbey, Mr Brown. At the back of Rose Cottage, the small cottage was lived in for some years by Pat and Peter Pengelly. Peter had been at sea for many years and had some great stories to recount. Then comes the second block of post-war houses where Mr and Mrs Warry lived. They were great supporters of the Church, as is their daughter Margaret, who still lives there. Next door lived the late Harry Corney, a much-missed and respected resident. He and his wife Maureen planted the shrubbery which is such a joy for me to look out onto. Their youngest son Stuart and his wife Zoe resided for some time in the end house. Stuart is now a gamekeeper in Shropshire. Then we move on to Lilac Cottage, with its wonderful garden, created by Ray Kirk and Jacqui Hardy - a truly remarkable feat which enhances that charming cottage. When I first came to Wykeham the late Ron Shepherdson, who lived in the house at the back of Lilac Cottage, could be seen every evening driving his fine herd of cattle up the village street, cleaning up the "detritus" they made during their slow and stately progress. Many a garden was well-fertilised as he threw it over the various garden walls!

Next time my odyssey will continue along the other side of the village. Watch this space!

The membership, currently standing at 65, is open to those between the ages of 10 and 26 and covers the Wykeham/Ruston area too. NEWS FROM WYKEHAM CRICKET CLUB

Lord Downe Offers Cricket Club Generous Help

We are most grateful to Lord Downe, who has offered the cricket club a substantial sum towards the cost of installing electricity at the club house. Members are to provide the labour and it is hoped to complete the work in early September when the cricket season has finished. Electricity connection will open up facilities and opportunities for the club: lighting, heating, possibly showers and electronic scoreboards and will certainly make the building more attractive to other organisations in the village.

Mixed start to the Season

The cricket season has got off to a mixed start. It is immediately apparent that the first eleven are going to miss their best bowler of last season Dave Pearson, who has had surgery on his heel and Achilles tendon. In addition, their best batsman Craig Bateman is returning to New Zealand and considers the travelling involved might be too much for him to play regularly. The team has already had one of their customary batting collapses but spirits are high and youngsters like Adam Eustace getting a chance in the side is bringing energy and enthusiasm into the team.

What is already clear is that the A Team in the Evening League, who have struggled for the last two seasons and have only just avoided relegation from the top Division, are not likely to suffer the same problems this year. One reason for this is the recruitment of Jack Holt, the Scarborough opening bowler on a regular basis. Strangely it is Jack's powerful batting which has been most influential: a quick-fire innings of thirty or forty can quickly sway a game. Jack has been ably supported by the Bruce brothers who also only play for Wykeham in the Evening League and the whole squad looks pretty competitive although they are yet to meet really top opposition.

The junior squads have also been hit by injuries, most notably to Henry Tubbs who has had appendicitis and Pressley Carr who has broken his leg playing rugby and is likely to be out for the whole of the season. This has weakened the under 13s side who were expected to do particularly well this season. The junior side that is living up to expectations is the under 16s; the Eustace brothers, Ben Norman, Tom Poor, and Max Lane are forming the core of what looks like a particularly powerful side and so far, with the side unbeaten, things are looking very promising.

VILLAGE MEMORIES EVENT



MILLENNIUM FOOTPATH GROUP

Sharp-eyed walkers will have noticed we have put up the new footpath signs, as shown overleaf! We took up various suggestions from residents and walkers, and the new maps include additional information such as "you are here" markers and the location of seats. Particular thanks go to Elaine Day for liaising with the designer and maker Don French, who has done a great job; to the William Dean Educational Fund for awarding us a grant; and to Laurence Day for putting up the new signs.

Other jobs carried out by the Footpath group have included lifting, splitting and replanting clumps of snowdrops in the top woodland near the cricket pitch and planting a new batch of bluebells in Fishpond Wood. There is ongoing work to keep the seat areas clear of nettles and other invasive weeds as well as cutting back the brambles and wild raspberries along the footpath through Fishpond Wood.

GARDEN NOTES

It is surprising just how many edibles can be grown in pots and containers – on a balcony, in a yard, on a sunny windowsill or by the kitchen door. To pick a few salad leaves or a handful of fresh parsley is so satisfying – fresh, a fraction of the cost of bought, and delicious. Radishes, different types of lettuce and carrots can be easily grown in pots, as well as French and climbing beans. There are now varieties of tumbling tomato that can be grown in hanging baskets, as well as strawberries (out of the way of pesky slugs). Sow the seed of herbs and vegetables little and often to get a steady supply. Terracotta pots, while looking pretty, tend to lose moisture more quickly than plastic ones, so if you use terracotta, line inside the pot with a perforated plastic bag and plant into that.

The current fashion in restaurants for microleaves (salads or herbs that are picked whilst very small) shows no sign of diminishing and these tiny leaves pack a surprising punch of flavour – beetroot is especially good, and looks very pretty scattered over other salad leaves. Sow seed thickly in a pot and harvest with scissors when the first set of leaves come up. Even growing mustard and cress on damp kitchen paper is worthwhile, and so easy. My favourite herb for growing in a pot has to be French tarragon. It is not particularly hardy and needs to be sheltered over winter – but its unusual, mild aniseed flavour goes well with fish and chicken and creamy pasta sauces, and is well worth the effort.

WHAT A HOOT



Spotted enjoying the sunshine in the paddock behind Town End in Ruston is this adult Little Owl. The Little Owl was introduced to the UK in the 19th century. It can be seen in the daylight, usually perching on a tree branch, telegraph pole or rock. It will bob its head up and down when alarmed; its diet consists of small birds and mammals, beetles and worms. Little Owl numbers are on the decline, with the UK population estimated to be down by 24 per cent between 1995 and 2008.

"My first recollections are of the day on which the 1914-18 War broke out. I would have been about five years old at the time. My father was, as his father had been, Groom to Lord Downe. My father came off the 3.30 train and went to get two ponies, Dolly and Mick.

Dolly had been Lord Downe's pony in the Boer War and I learned to ride on her along the usual path at that time round the back of Gallows Hill to the top end of Ruston. The other horses that I can remember from that time were found by Major Hugh Dawnay yoked into a gun-carriage. These were Lookout and Starlight, who wore their campaign ribbons in their bridles and the Mons Star. Major Dawnay was killed in the War.

During the 1914-18 War a light railway ran from Wykeham Village up onto Wykeham Moor to lead timber. £48,000 worth of timber was said to have been got out. To start with horses pulled the wagons up onto the Moor and they ran down again by gravity. Later a Mr Young, a blacksmith, converted a small road engine to run on the railway. We children used to push the rullies up from the depot just over the railway bridge in Wykeham on the right and ride down for fun".


