

# Parish Council

A meeting of the Parish Council was held on Monday 14 November 2011 and the following may be of interest:

All the councillors were present with Borough Councillor David Jeffels present for the first half of the meeting. Borough Councillor Jay-Hanmer was unable to attend and sent apologies. No members of the public were present.

Lady Downe invited Cllr. Jeffels to speak and he began by saying that Cllr. Sword is playing a vital role, along with others, in the work to safeguard the future of a Library service in East Ayton. The Working Party has submitted an initial Business Plan to the County Council and 50 volunteers of varying ages and interests are on board, developing ideas for the wider use of the Library facilities and for fund raising. The bid will be fine tuned over the next couple of months and an assessment is being made to determine what building improvements are needed. Local Parish Councils and Schools are being encouraged to support the campaign which should be publicised as much as possible including via the WRNM News

The Borough Council has developed a new Tourism Strategy to cover the next 3 years. Working with "Welcome to Yorkshire", the aim is to attract visitors from beyond the area's traditional catchment areas. Cllr. Jeffels is working at County level to prioritise funding for highways; to streamline the delivery of services while making budget cuts and is also assisting with the review of the services for young people. He has also been appointed to serve on the Local Government Association's Rural Policy Group.

A decision on the planning application for extending the mineral extraction at Wykeham Quarry has been delayed due to the need for further archaeological information. Councillor Jeffels will enquire if the County Council's Officers can provide a short summary of the Minerals and Waste Forward Planning documents.

Cllr. Jeffels completed his report by describing some of the legal and financial implications of the recent removal of the large beech tree in Irton. (which made the TV News!! - Ed)

#### **Finance**

Scarborough Borough Council is proposing to increase the Model Agreement grant from £2,291.00 in 2011/12 to £2,419.00 in 2012/13 in line with inflation. It was agreed to accept the Borough Council's proposed allocation of the money to budget headings on the understanding that adjustments can be made if necessary.

The Clerk presented a budget plan for the period to 31 March 2013 which projects that a balance of about £1,800.00 will exist in the current account at that time. This forecast can only be based on known commitments regarding income and expenditure but, in the light of this information, it was agreed to submit a Precept of £2,000.00 for 2012/13.

The Clerk reported that he has continued to research the options for achieving a better return on the funds in the Business Account. The position remains the same in that most Banks and Financial Institutions require large deposits and require the money to be tied up for several years if even a modest amount of interest is to be gained. The opportunity in National Savings Certificates has lessened as one of the most attractive offers has been withdrawn.

#### **Community Projects**

There has been no recent progress in respect of the Village Hall project.

A walk of the Millennium Walk and the longer loop has taken place when ways of spending the money allocated from the Whizz was discussed. Suggestions were made for improving signage for the walks and for printing a brochure. A further meeting will be held to firm up on ideas.

£500.00 is to be made available to the WRNM News! from the proceeds of the Whizz will ensure that printing costs are met into the New Year. (Hoorah! - Ed)

Cllr. Day asked if the Council wishes to repair holes in the Marquee and it was agreed to fund this work. It was also agreed that the Marquee can continue to be used on a limited basis at the request of worthwhile local causes and that an appropriate fee will be charged providing that the hirer agrees to use the recognised local workers to erect and dismantle the Marquee. The hirer will also have to confirm that insurance is in place to cover any claims or losses.

### Transportation and Highways matters

Members discussed a proposal by the County Council that concessionary free travel should be withdrawn from Scarborough's Park and Ride Services from 01 April 2012. This would mean that concessionaries would have to pay the full return fare, currently £2.10p, and it was agreed to respond by stating that £1.00 would be a fair amount.

Cllr. Barnett referred to a private initiative to combine a local snow clearing operation with gritting and the question was raised about the possibility of this service being extended to Wykeham and Ruston.

#### **Planning Application**

Consideration was given to an application for the construction of a replacement double garage and ancillary works at Forest Lodge, Moor Lane, Wykeham and it was agreed to not object to the principle of the development but to ask the National Park Authority to ensure that:

Any existing planning permission for a garage within the same cartilage is rescinded; Pan tile effect roofing materials are specified;

All elevations are clad in timber

Any approval is conditioned to ensure that the building is only used for the purposes stated in the application and

The applicant notifies the Dawnay Estates Manager of the proposals.




# Yorkshire Coast Radio



# Wykeham CC AGM 2011

Following tradition the first Thursday in November signalled the much awaited AGM of Wykeham Cricket Club. Although the attendance was not likely to cause great concern on the health and safety front it was undoubtedly higher than in previous years. Any lack of numbers was more than compensated for by the quality of debate.

Four decisions stood out: firstly that Wykeham is to apply to have a third team in the evening leagues next season. This team would have to play at the reserve ground at Burniston but this was seen as no great problem as the Saturday team already play there. The idea was put forward because, as a result of the strength of the first two evening sides, younger players were not getting much of a opportunity to play in the evenings. A third team which is to be captained by Ian Thompson, the manager of the junior division, would be an ideal vehicle for the older juniors to get a taste of senior cricket.

It was decided that Wykeham would propose the formation of an under 13 league. If this is accepted the club will no longer run an under 15 B team but will have an under 13 side instead. Wykeham is already seen as something of a model in the way that it runs its junior section and moves like this will only strengthen that view.

The third decision involved the proposed new clubhouse. This has been a project which has been floated for some years now without any tangible progress being made. The meeting decided that, because of the condition of the present pavilion a start would be made on a new building even if this meant that only a shell could be erected.

It was also decided that regular players who paid their subscriptions promptly should be rewarded and a scheme will be tried next season in which members can chose to pay a one off discounted subscription at the start of the season instead of paying match fees.

Thanks once again to the Downe Arms for providing such excellent facilities. The club responded to this by voting both Jane and Paul vice presidents of the club. A move which we are sure will open up countless social avenues for them.



## A Good Read

This quarter I'd like to share some classics with you, and ask for you to recommend books for me to read too. The best part of my job is the interaction I have with customers talking about books. There's no greater job satisfaction than someone coming into the shop, searching me out and telling me how much they have enjoyed one of my recommendations. Of course, just like a wine, a beer, or a chocolate bar, tastes vary and we all find different levels of pleasure from each book we read. Sometimes however a book is just so good that I can't believe anyone wouldn't enjoy it or at least accept it as worthwhile, and it's these that make those books a 'classic'.

My first choice is **To Kill a Mockingbird** by Harper Lee Many people will have been forced to read this at school and the very sound of the name will bring memories of the classroom flooding back. I was fortunate enough to not be prejudiced in this way and only read the book for the first time a couple of years ago. It is undoubtedly a book that sparked a multitude of books along similar lines and was very forward looking for its time. Set in the southern states of the USA, Atticus Finch wants to bring up his two children to be balanced individuals and his job as a lawyer gives plentiful opportunities for them to see prejudice and bigotry in action.




Choice number 2 is **Gone With the Wind** by Margaret Mitchell Mitchell's only work, the book far exceeds the film version, and in many ways is very different indeed. Admittedly the film is an absolute epic but the feel of the book is in a different league. Again set in the southern states (in fact, thinking about it, quite a few of my favourite books are set here) this is one of the greatest love stories of all time, without sentimentality, it faces the harsh issues of racism and slavery .




Book 3 is probably a less well known work by John Steinbeck: **East** of Eden

Better known for Of Mice and Men (admittedly still not read) I got a damaged copy of this book from work and although it took me a few chapters to believe I could understand his style of writing I am so pleased I persevered. It is essentially a family story spanning many years but is disturbing in its understated brutality and evil. Definitely not one for those times when you need a lighter read but worth the effort it takes. The film is not great, and I'd advise giving it a miss altogether. If you've already seen it, just forget it and enjoy the book.



And finally choice 4 is **Rebecca** by Daphne du Maurier. Anything and everything du Maurier wrote is worth a read but there's a reason this one is her best known. The Mandalay of my imagination is very different to the one in the film — what does it look like in your mind? A very readable work of fiction, this is excellent writing in a very accessible form. The more times you read it the better it becomes. If you've already read it, give it another go or there's a new collection of du Maurier's short stories, never previously published been released this year.
