There have been many highlights in my 13 years which include 3 successful Ofsted inspections; new classroom; many, many brilliant plays at the Downe Arms; lovely services at St Helen's Church; great trips out; the success and progress pupils have made, but most of all are the memories of the many pupils who have passed through our doors during my time here at Wykeham. There have also been some lows as one would expect, losing staff due to budget restrictions and falling roles; struggles with planning departments to get building improvements done and the odd dispute which needed resolving, but all of these have always been far out weighed by the fun and pleasure found in the children's comments and actions.

Since Christmas the Governors of the school have been busy appointing a new head teacher for Wykeham School. It was a long process for all concerned but James Pynn was finally appointed and has enthusiastically visited the schools many times since to ensure a smooth transition.



Following several weeks of studying the Iron Man and Iron Women the juniors put on some artistic performances of summaries of the books for parents and friends. The infants also completed their favourite topic on the Titanic with a dramatic presentation of the ships final journey. The children were excited by the topic and have lots of fascinating facts to share.

A special Easter service was held in the St Helen's Church before the Easter break with poems, and prayers written and performed by the children. There was a short play by KS2.

In April the year 5 and 6 children went with the cluster schools, Hackness, Brompton and Snainton to East Barnby for a 3 day residential visit. The weather was kind and the children had a fantastic time sailing, canoeing, rock climbing, orienteering, gorge walking and sledging. They had a great time making new friends, learning how to make beds and singing round the camp fire.



In recent weeks you may have seen children from school about the villages on their bikes. They have all been completing their level 1 and 2 of Bikeability which teaches them about road safety, good biking skills and safe riding.

The infants have been looking at Seaside Holidays in the past and present. They have been performing Punch and Judy shows and visited the seaside to see all the sights they have been learning about. They bought ice creams and postcards, visited the Penny Arcades and went rock pooling. They had a lovely day with the sun shining brightly for them.

The juniors enjoyed a lively, amusing presentation by the Science Museum at Graham School on 'Glorious Blood' The show was very practical with lots of audience participation. The children loved the gory aspect of the show.

We have a busy term left with a Jubilee tea and Kite Flying, We are part of a large school choir singing at the Olympic Torch Ceremony at the Open Air Theatre. We also have lots of sporting events to look forward to. We are all hoping for lots of bright clear weather so we can enjoy it all.

## Parish Council

The Annual Parish Council Meeting was held on Tuesday 15 May 2012 and the following may be of interest:

All the councillors were present. Also present for the first part of the meeting was County and Borough Councillor David Jeffels. Borough Cllr. M Jay-Hanmer was unable to attend.

#### Election of Officials for 2012/13

Lady Downe was elected as Chair. Cllr. Terry be elected as Vice Chairman.

#### **Matters Arising from previous Meeting**

Cllr. Sword is continuing to follow up the state of fly tipping adjacent to the North Moor railway bridge and he will contact the Highways Area Office about this problem. Work has started on the construction of the new Cricket Pavilion. Funding of £25K was received from Yorventure and although the plans have been scaled down, the design allows for expansion if additional finance becomes available. Offers of building materials have been gratefully received but the requirement for insulation has triggered the need for Planning and Building Regulations approval and this resulted in delays and extra cost.

#### **Community Projects**

The National Park Authority will not be able to help fund development of the Millennium Walk and the longer loop. Discussions are taking place with Scarborough Seachange over funding and there is some money available in the Village Account. A working party of 5 people is considering the suggestions for improving signage for the walks and for printing a brochure, along with ideas for commissioning sculptures, planting bulbs and the provision of steps and picnic tables at the Ruston end of the Walk. Cllr. Sword asked about plans for the "new Village Green" in Ruston and Cllr. Day commented that people are wary about crossing the land because of the presence of sheep and horses. He suggested that a corridor could be created by fencing to encourage use by pedestrians. It was AGREED that Cllr. Sword would arrange a meeting with Mrs Risker to discuss the matter.

Cllr. Terry commented on the discussions at the last Parish Council Meeting when alternative ways of funding and publishing the **WRNM News** were considered. Both he and Mrs Terry are strongly of the view that local people value the newsletter in its current printed format. The Clerk confirmed that even with the donation of £500.00 from last year's Whizz, funding for printing has now been exhausted and it was **AGREED** to use money banked from hiring out the Marquee to pay for the next edition. This is on the understanding that a strategy for funding future editions will be considered at the next Parish Council Meeting. (please send your comments, thoughts and ideas to the Ed)

Cllr. Sword provided an update on the former Ayton Library which is now called **Derwent Valley BRIDGE**. The new facilities opened today (15 May) when it was very busy. He commented on the amazing work of the Steering Group which has been fully supported by North Yorkshire County Council. The approved Business Plan is being held up as an exemplar for others to follow. Cllr. Jeffels endorsed these comments and said that West Ayton Parish Council has responded to a request for top-up funds by agreeing to donate £1,200.00 towards running costs. It was **AGREED** to use £100.00 from the Marquee fund for the same purpose. (further information on page 8 – Ed)

Further to the consideration of options at the last Meeting for celebrating **the Queen's Jubilee and the Olympics**, the Clerk reported on his discussion with Mrs Clothier. She is happy for the School children to be involved with tree planting on Friday 01 June and it

was **AGREED** to liaise with her over the planting of single oak trees in Wykeham and Ruston. Cllr. Sword will decide on the precise locations.

The Clerk reported that Scarborough Borough Council is making 5 seats available at the Open Air Theatre on Monday 18 June when there will be celebrations to mark the appearance of the **Olympic Torch**. People are being asked to attend from 10.00 hours for a four hour production and Cllr. Barnett said he and Mrs Barnett would like to be present.

Cllr. Terry commented that some of the Gun Club's activities in the former Wykeham Quarry seem to be taking place in close proximity to the public highway. It was **AGREED** that Cllr. Barnett would check the current arrangements.

#### **Consultations**

The main content of Scarborough Borough Council's consultation on the Brief for the Futurist and Town Hall development. It was AGREED to make the following comments:

- i. There is no objection to the demolition of the Futurist but any new development must include an auditorium and supporting facilities capable of hosting the type of production that has been so successful in recent times.
- ii. The creation of a new "super" pedestrian link between King Street and the Foreshore is not supported. Instead, every effort should be made to improve existing links and to channel pedestrian flow to Newborough/Eastborough, the Market Hall/Vaults and the Old Town.
- iii. Only viable and realistic plans should be encouraged. It is frustrating when developers get permission based on the inclusion of exciting elements that will benefit the community, only for these to be reneged on once the profitable part has been built.

The Clerk reported on the receipt of amended details for the planning application for a **Wind Farm at East Heslerton**. It was **AGREED** to repeat the objection made by the Parish Council in May 2011 i.e. "because of the visual impact it would have over a wide area of largely unspoilt countryside."

#### Correspondence

Members received and considered the following:

- i. Notification of highway maintenance on Wykeham Lane to North Moor (The Clerk was asked to refer the poor state of Main Street in Wykeham and blocked gulleys on the A170) to the Highways Area Office).
- ii. Recruitment of 2 co-opted independent members of the North Yorkshire Police and Crime Panel.
- iii. Notification of proposed drilling operations by Viking UK Gas Ltd. in Wykeham Forest (Brompton and Sawdon Parish).

#### Date and time of next Meeting

#### This was followed by the Parish Meeting

No members of the public were present.

The Assembly received a presentation from Mr Steve Wilson who was representing Scarborough Borough Council.

He began by explaining that the Government has changed dramatically some of the approaches to town and country planning and now favours a bottom up approach to development. Regional and District wide targets for housing have been abandoned in favour of locally prepared plans. Towns and villages accepting growth can expect central funding for new facilities. The new approach is evidenced by the fact that the Government's guidance on planning matters has been reduced from around 1,000 pages to just 10.

One of the ways that local communities are being encouraged to play a part in future planning is by the introduction of Neighbourhood Plans. These will sit somewhere between the simple Parish Plans and the formal Local Plans which remain the responsibility of the Borough/District Councils. Parish Councils will be responsible for preparing Neighbourhood Plans and these will carry some statutory weight when planning decisions are made by higher Authorities.

The Borough Council has a statutory duty to assist Parishes who embark on a Neighbourhood Plan and it will be interesting to see how the costs are apportioned as the process will take up to 2 years and will involve a modest public examination of the Plan and a referendum on whether it should be adopted.

Mr Wilson closed by referring to the progress being made on the Borough Wide Local Plan with the next public stage being planned for Autumn 2012. The Borough Council's response to the various proposals for development put forward by land owners will be confirmed at that time and Mr Wilson mentioned those submitted in Wykeham and Ruston. He said he was cautious about extending the existing approved limits of development unless there are good reasons to do so.

Lady Downe thanked Mr Wilson for attending.

PCSO Richard Newcombe presented the latest Police Report for the Derwent Valley Ward and confirmed the details for contacting the Police depending on the nature of the incident/request. He pointed to the overall decrease of 23 in the number of reported crimes in the year to the end of March 2012 and went on to describe some recent cases.

There have been a number of crimes involving the theft of vehicles, vehicle parts and fuel and also several burglaries at commercial premises. The Police are working with the Environment Agency to make regular checks on garages and scrap dealers although some of the crimes involve people from outside the County boundary. Liaison continues with the National Park Rangers in attempts to limit the excesses of off-roaders and these efforts have resulted in warnings being issued and vehicles seized.



In "Hope and Glory" Stuart Maconie goes in search of the days that shaped the Britain we live in today. ## Garden Notes

There is still plenty of time to sow seeds of some annual flowers directly into the soil in the

garden. Particularly good value are Zinnia and Larkspur. They are taller (2-3ft), aren't fussy about conditions, flower over a long period and are lovely as cut flowers too. The petals of Larkspur can be dried and used in pot pourri, and were traditionally used as wedding confetti. Also good do-ers, and particularly relevant in view of the forecast drought, are Nasturtiums, which prefer poor, dry soil in full sun, and which can be trailing or bush forms. Their vivid orange and yellow colours are really showy, and, best of all, the flowers and leaves are edible, like a peppery sort of lettuce. On the



theme of edible flowers, if you have chives in the garden which are going to seed, they will produce pretty purple flower heads, and these are delicious separated into individual florets and scattered over salads or in egg sandwiches.

Some permanent perennial plants and annuals can benefit from being cut back by half in mid-May (known as the Chelsea chop). This will delay and prolong the flowering period, encourages stronger plants with more flower heads and prevents the plants from becoming too leggy and sprawling - for example, Cornflowers, Sedums, Sweet peas.

And finally, it's always worth finding a corner by the front or back door, under windows or near seating areas to sow some Night Scented Stock - a lovely vanilla perfume released after dusk.

## **Building of Cricket Club Pavillion Starts!**

A start has been made on building a new cricket pavilion. J.C Robinson's have been employed to put up the new structure which is diametrically opposite to the old pavilion and close to the entrance to the Park

The funding of the building has been made possible by a grant of £25000 from Yorventure to whom the cricket club are enormously grateful. They have also been helped by Dawnay Estates and The Viscount Downe who have donated the cedar wood with which the building is to be clad. Kingspan Ltd have donated insulation material.

This stage of the building will by no means produce the finished article however. The club still has to raise the finance to secure the connection of electricity and then to provide showering facilities and furniture.



Although the building is not seen as an alternative to a village hall the cricket club hope that it will become something of a centre for village activity and they hope that village groups will use it as a home.

The cricket club hope that the building will enable it to provide facilities for more players, at the

moment it has to rent a pitch near Burniston to accommodate its third team, and also to eventually open up other groups. Tentative enquiries have been made about building an all weather tennis court and perhaps providing playground facilities although these

ventures are very much for the future and in any case would require the agreement of Dawnay Estates.

#### Slow Start to the Season

The poor weather in early May has meant a rather slow start to the season for most of the Wykeham Cricket Club sides. The newly formed Evening League C Team and its captain lan Thompson have had to wait sometime for their first ever league game as the first three have all been called off because of inclement weather. Ironically this could be relatively good news as the points awarded for a cancelled games have allowed them to occupy a mid table position whereas both the first and second teams are bottom of their respective leagues after the opening rounds of matches. In mitigation however both teams have been promoted this season and it may take a bit of time until they find their feet.

The Saturday First Team have also had an unfortunate start to their campaign, their most successful bowler and probably one of the best bowlers in the league, Dave Pearson, has a shoulder injury and is restricted to batting. A further set back occurred when, after only three overs of the first game, stalwart batsman Pete Shepherdson suffered a broken jaw.

Slightly better news from the junior teams with the under 11 side actually topping zone 2 of their division. The under 13's have made a steady start winning one, drawing one and losing one but unfortunately the under 15's have followed the lead of the senior sides and have yet to register a victory.
